

The Saunders Castle at Park Place and Tower – Boston

The Castle and Tower, one of Boston's historical buildings and city landmarks was built in the 1890's modeled after a medieval fortress.

This Romanesque Revival-style structure was once part of the Armory built in the 1890s to store arms and house a rifle range, a military gym, and a drill hall. The Armory was planned, constructed and financed by the First Corps of Cadets; a Massachusetts military organization established in 1741. The Armory is the only remaining High Victorian armory in the City of Boston and a designated National Historic Landmark. The Castle has hosted some of Boston's most exclusive events throughout the years. In the early 2000s, Smith & Wollensky steakhouse opened inside the adjacent, fourstory head house now known as the Tower until it closed its doors in 2018.

Titanic Exhibit at the Castle

Visitors embark on an interactive tour of the *Titanic* with incredible re-creations of the Ship's interior and exterior. Visitors receive a replica boarding pass, assume the role of a passenger, and follow a chronological journey through life on *Titanic*. Walk the halls, explore the galleries, peer into cabins, and meet passengers and crew throughout the voyage.

The 15,000-square-foot Exhibition features replica interior rooms and a full-scale re-creation of the Grand Staircase. Visitors will be able to view authentic artifacts, respectfully recovered from two and a half miles below the surface of the North Atlantic, which tell the real story behind *Titanic*'s journey from construction to eventual recovery. The genuine artifacts on display offer emotional connections to the forever-altered lives of those who were on board *Titanic*.
